### 1. PURPOSE

To delineate key roles and responsibilities with respect to the academic governance of Morling College.

### 3. CONTEXT AND SCOPE

Morling College (MC) is a registered Higher Education Provider (HEP: PRV12034) of accredited courses in Education, Counselling and Chaplaincy and Spiritual Care. MC also offers coursework awards and Higher Degree Research (HDR) training in Theology (AQF 5-10), accredited through a third party arrangement with the Australian College of Theology (ACT), and Higher Degree Research training in Theology (AQF 9-10) as a member College of the University of Divinity (UD). Consequently, MC's academic governance arrangements will incorporate the appropriate requirements for each area according to the relevant accrediting authority.

This policy therefore relates primarily to the academic governance of courses offered by Morling as an independent HEP. It also relates to the academic governance of courses offered under third party arrangements with other HEPs, insofar as it touches on the overall quality of learning, teaching, research and research training within MC and requires compliance with the academic governance requirements of the ACT and UD, where they apply.

### 4. POLICY STATEMENT

Morling College is committed to ensuring the quality and integrity of its teaching, learning, research and research training activities, and to complying with the requirements of the Higher Education Standards Framework (HESF), other higher education regulations, and the academic governance arrangements of the ACT and UD.

## 5. PRINCIPLES

### Delegations of Responsibility

#### ***Academic Board***

- 5.1 The MC Board delegates to the Academic Board (AB) responsibility for overseeing the quality and integrity of its teaching, learning, research and research training activities.
- 5.2 The responsibilities, membership, terms of office and meeting protocols for the Academic Board are defined in the Academic Board Terms of Reference.

#### ***Committees and Panels***

- 5.3 The Academic Board may delegate particular functions and responsibilities within the scope of its authority to committees and panels that it establishes, including the Learning and Teaching Committee and Research Committee, both of which exist as standing committees of the Academic Board.
- 5.4 The responsibilities, membership, terms of office and meeting protocols for the Learning and Teaching Committee and Research Committee are defined in the Terms of Reference for those two committees.
- 5.5 In addition to those two committees, the Academic Board may appoint other committees and panels. Such committees and panels receive their authority by delegation from the Academic Board and report to the Academic Board on their activities.

#### ***Morling College Staff***

- 5.6 The Academic Board may also delegate functions and responsibilities within the scope of its authority to members of the Morling College staff, who are to report on these matters to the Academic Board.

### Independence and Interdependence

#### ***Independence***

- 5.7 The AB is to exercise its functions of oversight and scrutiny with rigour and independence of judgement, offering informed and expert advice to the MC Board.

#### ***Interdependence***

- 5.8 Where academic and non-academic matters intersect, the AB is to offer its advice to the MC Board on those elements of policy and strategy that have a bearing on the quality and integrity of MC's learning, teaching, research and research training.
- 5.9 The primary channels of communication between the AB and the MC Board are the reports that the chair of the AB presents to both bodies and the

minutes of each AB meeting, which are to be made available in full to the next MC Board meeting. Additional channels of communication include the presence of the MC Principal as a non-voting member at MC Board meetings, and a standing invitation to the MC Chief Academic Officer to attend meetings of the MC Board in the same capacity. Assessments of academic risk made by the AB are to be made available to the Risk Management Committee, which may add its comments; the MC Board is to receive both the AB's risk assessments and recommendations and the comments of the Risk Management Committee.

## Academic Governance Arrangements of other Higher Education Providers

### ***Compliance***

- 5.10 Any learning, teaching, research or research training activities undertaken by Morling College under third party provider arrangements with the ACT or UD, or any other HEP, shall be conducted in accordance with the policies and regulations of the relevant HEP.

### ***Participation***

- 5.11 Where there are opportunities to do so, MC staff, Board members and AB members will participate constructively in the academic governance arrangements of the ACT and UD (and any other HEP with which MC enters into a third party arrangement for learning, teaching, research or research training).
